IDAY is an international network created in 2008 at the request of several African civil associations. They come together as national coalitions to engage in a constructive dialogue with their governments to ensure that they respect the fundamental right of every young African to quality education.

IDAY Regional Programmes

Education and Health: ecological school gardens and canteens - Fight against malaria with *Artemisia annua*. Education and protection: Protection and training of young domestic workers, education of minors in prison and education in post-conflict areas.

Assessing the performance of basic education systems: data collection for advocacy and achievement of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

As members of IDAY's network, coalitions are encouraged to engage in efficient advocacy actions. The advocacy agenda and themes are decided by local civil society.


Advocacy with the authorities is also supported by concrete activities.


Recent studies on foreign aid have proven it is efficient when the intervention brings the people closer to their authorities.
